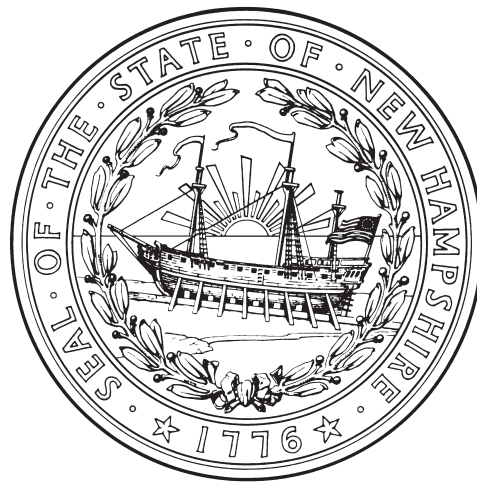

HB 1415-FN-A, establishing a death benefit for a school employee killed in the line of duty.

HB 1817-FN, establishing the position of state demographer and a commission on demographic trends; requiring state agencies to prepare 10-year current services cost projections; and relative to the inclusion of a demographic analysis as part of the legislative fiscal note process.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

HB 1807-FN, relative to exploitation of elderly, disabled, or impaired adults and establishing a protective order for vulnerable adults.

Without objection, the FN Report is adopted.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Senator Bradley moved that the Consent Calendar, with the relevant amendments as printed in the day's Calendar be adopted and that all such bills found Ought-to-Pass be ordered as follows:

FN bills not waived under Senate Rule 4-5, to the Committee on Finance; non-FN bills approved for referral to Finance by the day's FN report, to the Committee on Finance; and all other bills, to Third Reading.

ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES

HB 1474, designating the New Hampshire Red as the official state poultry.
Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Avard for the committee.

This bill will designate the New Hampshire Red as the official state poultry. A fourth grade class at Canaan Elementary School researched the chicken and found that it has a rich history in our state and has qualities worthy of recognition. The New Hampshire Red is noted for its intelligence, resilience, and ability to withstand cold winters. Such qualities are representative of New Hampshire residents, making the chicken a good choice for the state's official poultry.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS AND ADMINISTRATION

HB 1415-FN-A, establishing a death benefit for a school employee killed in the line of duty.
Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Soucy for the committee.

This bill establishes a \$100,000 death benefit for the family of a school employee killed in the line of duty. The Governor, with the consent of the Executive Council, is authorized to draw a warrant for said sum out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

HB 1571, authorizing an alternative recovery monitoring program for nurses licensed by the board of nursing.
Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Cavanaugh for the committee.

This legislation authorizes the Board of Nursing to operate or contract for an Alternative Recovery Monitoring Program for nurses impaired by substance use disorders or mental or physical illness. This program is similar to those already in existence for doctors and dentists.

HB 1664, relative to terms of appointment of members of governing boards for allied health professionals.
Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Gannon for the committee.

This bill clarifies the eligibility to reappoint a member of a governing board of an allied health profession to an additional full term. This change will allow an individual who serves a partial term on the Board, less than one-half of that three year term, to be able to serve the partial term plus two full terms.

HB 1665, relative to the authority of the governing boards of allied health professionals.
Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Reagan for the committee.

This bill clarifies the authority of the governing boards of allied health professionals concerning individuals who are certified by such boards. This will give the board clear guidelines in addition to clarifying authority to what they can or to what they are allowed to do.

JUDICIARY

HB 252, relative to pro se litigants under the right-to-know law.
Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Gannon for the committee.

This bill clarifies the procedures for pro se litigants under the right-to-know law. With this bill, all documents filed with a petition and any responses will automatically be considered evidence in the case, and all documents submitted shall be provided to the opposing party prior to a hearing on the merits. The Committee amended the bill to clarify the language.

Amendment to HB 252

Amend RSA 91-A:7 as inserted by section 1 of the bill by replacing it with the following:

91-A:7 Violation. Any person aggrieved by a violation of this chapter may petition the superior court for injunctive relief. In order to satisfy the purposes of this chapter, the courts shall give proceedings under this chapter high priority on the court calendar. Such a petitioner may appear with or without counsel. The petition shall be deemed sufficient if it states facts constituting a violation of this chapter, and may be filed by the petitioner or his or her counsel with the clerk of court or any justice thereof. Thereupon the clerk of court or any justice shall order service by copy of the petition on the person or persons charged. ***Subject to objection by the parties or ruling by the court, or both, all documents filed with the petition and any response thereto shall be considered as evidence by the court. All documents submitted shall***

be provided to the opposing party prior to a hearing on the merits. When any justice shall find that time probably is of the essence, he or she may order notice by any reasonable means, and he or she shall have authority to issue an order ex parte when he or she shall reasonably deem such an order necessary to insure compliance with the provisions of this chapter.

HB 1420-FN, relative to a criminal penalty for driving after certification as an habitual offender.
Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Hennessey for the committee.

This bill reinstates the misdemeanor offense for driving after certification as a habitual offender. That offense had been inadvertently repealed during the amending of the mandatory minimum sentences statute and this bill will appropriately reinstate it.

HB 1564-FN, relative to sexual assault of a victim who is incarcerated in a correctional institution by a person with supervisory or disciplinary authority over the victim.
Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Lasky for the committee.

This bill amends the definition of aggravated felonious sexual assault when a victim is incarcerated in a correctional facility. These changes affirm the Legislature's established policy on recognizing that sexual relations between someone in a position of power and authority over someone in custody or detention, including during transportation, constitutes as sexual assault.

Amendment to HB 1564-FN

Amend the bill by replacing section 1 with the following:

1 Aggravated Felonious Sexual Assault. Amend RSA 632-A:2, I(n)(1) to read as follows:

(1) When the actor has direct supervisory ~~[or]~~, disciplinary, ***or other authority authorized by law over, or direct responsibility for maintaining detention of,*** the victim by virtue of the victim being ***detained or*** incarcerated in a correctional institution, the secure psychiatric unit, ~~[or]~~ juvenile detention facility ~~[where the actor is employed]~~, ***or any other setting in which the victim is not free to leave;*** or

AMENDED ANALYSIS

This bill amends the elements necessary for charging aggravated felonious sexual assault in cases where the victim is incarcerated in a correctional facility or is detained in any other setting in which the victim is not free to leave.

HB 1739-FN, prohibiting female genital mutilation.
Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Carson for the committee.

This bill would impose criminal penalties on those involved in female genital mutilation. The Committee amended the bill to include female genital mutilation within the definition of 'abused child' in order to ensure proper reporting occurs.

Amendment to HB 1739-FN

Amend RSA 632-A:10-d as inserted by section 1 of the bill by inserting after paragraph III the following new paragraph:

IV. Any child subjected to conduct prohibited by paragraph I, but which is not justified pursuant to paragraph III, shall be considered an abused child pursuant to RSA 169-C:3, II.

Amend the bill by inserting after section 1 the following and renumbering the original section 2 to read as 3:

2 Abused Child; Definition. Amend RSA 169-C:3, II(d) to read as follows:

(d) Physically injured by other than accidental means; **or**

(e) Subjected to an act prohibited by RSA 632-A:10-d.

PUBLIC AND MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

HB 1215, relative to voting on variances.

Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Birdsell for the committee.

This bill as amended will require that a municipal zoning board shall use one method consistently for all applications until the board formally votes to change the voting method. This legislation will provide protection from discrimination against applicants.

Amendment to HB 1215

Amend RSA 674:33, I(c) as inserted by section 1 of the bill by replacing it with the following:

(c) The board shall use one voting method consistently for all applications until it formally votes to change the method. Any change in the board's voting method shall not take effect until 60 days after the board has voted to adopt such change and shall apply only prospectively, and not to any application that has been filed and remains pending at the time of the change.

HB 1304, relative to the authorization for forensic audits by a county convention.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Kahn for the committee.

This bill clarifies that a county delegation has the authority to appropriate a contingency fund for the purpose of forensic audits of county financial matters. Further it provides that the county commissioners shall approve the expenditure for the forensic audits.

HB 1533, relative to termination of variances and special exceptions.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Gray for the committee.

This bill clarifies the process for termination of variances and special exceptions that were authorized before August 19, 2013. It allows for enough notice before termination, that property owners may exercise the variance or special exception should they wish.

HB 1593, authorizing a school district meeting to adopt an article authorizing the trustees of the trust fund to charge certain expenses against capital reserve funds.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Gray for the committee.

This bill will allow school districts to adopt an article authorizing the trustees of the trust fund to charge expenses incurred in employing trust departments of certain financial institutions against capital reserve funds. Municipalities are already allowed to do this and this legislation will extend that authority to the trustee of the school district trust fund.

HB 1638, declaring April 7, 2018 as tabletop gaming day in New Hampshire.

Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Kahn for the committee.

This bill as amended declares April 28, 2018 as tabletop gaming day in New Hampshire. Over the last decade there has been a huge increase in the industry of tabletop board gaming. This legislation will bring New Hampshire in line with many other places participating in tabletop gaming day on April 28th.

He was my State Rep at one point, and I served with him in the House. Mister Sean McGuinness established his career as a mortgage banker, and he was dedicated to thirty years in the industry, which also included owning and operating his own business in Downtown Nashua. Sean is a former Ward 1 Alderman, which he served two terms. He was also a former State Rep in Ward 1, and he was a member of the Board of Harbor Homes for many years. In his free time Sean enjoyed fishing and skiing. I'm going to add he also liked Scotch, and he was a good man. He will be forever missed for the loyal and faithful friend and family man that he was. He truly enjoyed his time with his family and he cherished every minute. And one final note, Mister President, there are very few people that I can say that I've never heard him say a bad word about a single soul. He worked well with both sides of the aisle, and he was a kind man, and he's surely going to be missed. So, I ask that it be put into the permanent record, please. Thank you, Mister President.

SENATOR D'ALLESANDRO: Thank you, Mister President. Just a notice: Stewart Lamprey, former Speaker of the House, and former President of the Senate passed. SENATOR WOODBURN: I rise to pay tribute to Clayton Hinds of Colebrook; graduated Colebrook Academy, served in the United States Army, varied career as an aviation mechanic at Pratt Whitney, TW Express before returning home to Colebrook in 1991 to take over his family's business, the Colebrook Country Club, which was a gathering place for all social organizations and community causes of which he was an instrumental part, including the Kiwanis, the Ski-Bees, the Trail Master, the Vershire Center, the 45th Parallel EMS. He is survived by his wife, Michelle, and his two daughters, Megan and Elizabeth, as well as his parents and siblings.

As well, I'd like to pay tribute and honor to George, better known as Dave Roberts, formerly of Lancaster; graduate of local schools: White Mountain Regional High School; long time coach—actually coached me many years ago. In 1983 Class I State Championship Team from White Mountain Regional High School; long time sports reporter for the *Coos County Democrat*; and just a great all-around person who cared about people, who cared about kids. I could still see his twinkle in his eye as he rode the mower around the Colonel Town fields in Lancaster, and I just wanted to pay tribute to him.

And, finally, Mister President, we have a birthday that just occurred: Eleanor Brady turned 99 years old. She is the *Boston Post* Cane recipient in the town of Jefferson. And she is the founder of Six Gun City, and a member of the Hall of Fame of the New England Amusement Park Associations. She is the mother of the big "Brady Bunch" from Jefferson, who spread all over New Hampshire doing many, many great things including Commissioner Tom Brady, and former Secretary in the Reagan Administration, Larry Brady, and many, many other more Brady's, which she very much leaves her impression on all of them, and all of us. SENATOR KAHN: Thank you, Mister President. I rise for a moment of personal privilege to remember Katie Metzger; don't know if folks recall Katie—ten year veteran in the House, and representing Fitzwilliam and Richmond in Cheshire County. Katie, who was born in 1923 died March 29th in Concord. Katie moved and

retired to Fitzwilliam in 1976; we were lucky. She fell in love with New England, and it soon became evident to everyone in Fitzwilliam that she was a leader and a talented one, at that. She served on Fitzwilliam's Town Board as Chairwoman of the Planning Board, and on the Board of Selectmen, and as Chairwoman of the Conservation Commission, always identifying herself as an environmentalist. She was an incorporator of the Cheshire Medical Center as Chairwoman of the Executive Committee, and she was on the Southwest Regional Planning Commission, and the Fitzwilliam Town Library where she helped lead an effort to raise substantial funds for the libraries renovation and expansion. Although a go-getter, she was always humble and quick to acknowledge that it takes many people working collaboratively for the success of any project. From 1988 to 1998, Katie served in the New Hampshire House of Representatives. She ended her career in the legislature as the Chairwoman of the Municipal and County Government Committee. She was known as a good listener, fair in her deliberations, and accessible to her constituents. A memorial service will be held in the Fitzwilliam Community Church on Saturday, June 16th at 11 a.m. and the Reverend Curtis Metzger, her son and a resident of Boscaawen, will be presiding. It's in deep respect and memory that I ask for that privilege, and thank you, Mister President.
