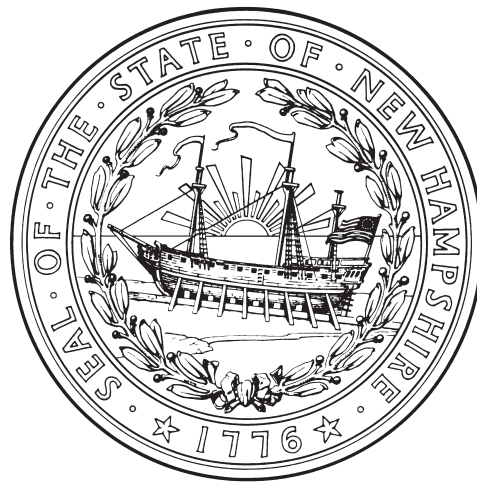

I have worked with her on so many different projects over those thirty years. - (m) The president of the New Hampshire Trooper's Association, or designee.
- (n) The president of the New England Police Benevolent Association, or designee.

Amend RSA 273:28-a, IV as inserted by section 1 of the bill by replacing it with the following:

IV. The members of the commission shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the commission shall be called by the senate member. The first meeting of the commission shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section. Six members of the commission shall constitute a quorum.

SB 30, relative to the advisory board on services for children, youth, and families.
Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Reagan for the committee.

This bill reduces the quorum of the advisory board on services for children, youth, and families to allow the board to more efficiently complete their duties. The bill also eliminates the requirement that no two members appointed by either the governor, senate president, or speaker of the house shall be from the same county.

TRANSPORTATION

SB 37, relative to the registration of motor vehicles.
Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Birdsell for the committee.

This bill pertains to nonresident vehicle registrations. Current law enables a nonresident to register a vehicle in New Hampshire if they exclusively garage the vehicle in the state. This does not enable a non-

resident to travel outside NH overnight with that vehicle. If they were to do so and have an accident, they could experience the denial of an insurance claim. This bill eliminates the requirement that the vehicle be garaged exclusively in New Hampshire and replaces it with a requirement that it be garaged in New Hampshire for 6 months or more. This change will grant nonresidents who choose to register a vehicle in New Hampshire the flexibility to travel outside of the state as needed.

SB 38, naming a bridge in Tamworth in honor of David Bowles.

Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Watters for the committee.

This bill names a bridge on Route 113 in Tamworth in memory of David Bowles. Mr. Bowles was a lifelong resident of Tamworth and was an engineer with the NH Department of Transportation for 38 years. He was well respected, having served the Town of Tamworth and surrounding communities in many capacities over the years including as a volunteer firefighter. The committee amendment simply clarifies which bridge is to be named in honor of Mr. Bowles.

PRESIDENT SOUCY: I have three announcements. First, our photographer, who was here with us earlier this morning, has been patiently waiting for those of you who have not had head shots yet, in room 100.

And the third announcement is that we will not have session next Thursday, but we will use that day for hearings. The following committees will be able to meet in the morning: Education, Energy, and Judiciary. In the afternoon: Commerce, Election, and Health. If another committee wishes to meet, please notify the Clerk's Office, and we can try to accommodate scheduling. We just want to be careful not to have overlapping membership.

(The Chair recognized Senator Fuller Clark.)

SENATOR FULLER CLARK: Personal privilege, please? Thank you very much. I'm bringing up sad news from the seacoast with the loss, over the last month or so, of two really amazing individuals.

The first is former Rockingham County Commissioner Maureen Barrows, and I'm going to take the remarks from The Herald because I thought they were so compelling.

She died on December 26, 2018 after a twenty-six year battle with cancer. She has been remembered by political leaders around the state, with Governor Sununu tweeting that Barrows was a "dedicated public servant devoted to the well-being of Granite Staters." She was also known as being rather remarkably feisty, and independent individual. When it was appropriate, she supported Republicans; and when she believed it wasn't appropriate, she would support Democrats.

I was honored to have known her and to work with her, and so did my mother, a one-term Republican in the state of Maine.

She had a feisty sense of humor, but she was always thinking about others and how she could help them no matter what was going on in her own life. She spent a remarkable twenty-one years as the County Commissioner, and a quote from the Director of Human Services said Barrows was dedicated to helping those working at the county and benefitting home services. She was affectionately remembered as an ideal person constantly giving her and others a list of things that needed to be taken care of. And as a registered Republican, Barrows earned the reputation of being one of the state's political movers and shakers in the First-in-the-Nation Primary with presidential candidates vying for her endorsement. She was particularly, and you shouldn't be surprised by this, a supporter of Senator John McCain, and she also, like McCain, was a "maverick" bucking party lines to support issues that were important to her and her constituents; like advocating for additional funding for county services; to her pro-choice positions and support for funding Planned Parenthood. She always put people above her needs. [At the same time I'd like to add that] her life was not easy. She experienced great pain losing a baby shortly after birth; her son, David, to an automobile accident; and her husband, Cal, in 2012. But she continued to persevere up until the time of her death. She was one of five women known as the "founding mothers" that started the Richie McFarland Center in 1971, and provides early childhood intervention services for children with special needs. Barrows died the day after Christmas, but her legacy will live on, and she truly made a difference in Rockingham County and throughout the state.

Just a few weeks later, the Reverend Doctor Arthur Hilson, at age eighty-two; husband of Florine Hilson of Portsmouth, entered the gates of heaven on Saturday, January 19, 2019, and these comments, to some degree, are again taken from The Herald and from the obituary:

He was a loving brother, husband, father, pastor, friend, leader, teacher, and mentor to so many. He was born April 6, 1936 in Cincinnati, Ohio to the late Bertha McAdoo Wilburn and Shepherd Hilson. Reverend Hilson was an educator at heart, who had an unwavering faith in God. Pastor at New Hope Church for twenty-eight years; a teacher and administrator for forty years including the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, the University of New Hampshire, Durham; and was the associate pastor at the Bethlehem Community Baptist Church in Holyoke, Mass until he moved to Portsmouth, New Hampshire in 1991. He longed to educate people in the Word of God, and the legacy of that which comes in America. And over the last eighteen years he became one of the most beloved teachers at Portsmouth High School and sought after educators to all. He is survived by his loving wife Florine; nine children: Cameron Oliva, Melinda Jean, Arthur Lee, Jr., Brian Keith, Cecilia Olivia, Dorothy Lynn, Jeffery Henry, Antoinette Jean, and David Jeremiah. And I would add that he also lost two children. He also clearly, with that large of a family, was a host of grandchildren, great-grandchildren, nieces and nephews.

So what I wanted to say that he was beloved by the city of Portsmouth. And if one met Hilson on the street, in his church, in a school, or anywhere else and asked him how he was doing, this was his answer: he said, "I am too blessed to complain." That's what he said over and over again. But he may have been blessed, but the city of Portsmouth was also blessed because of his choice to live his life here. So, just in closing, I wanted to say that a week ago Saturday the Central Baptist Church in Portsmouth was filled with overflowing with close to a thousand people in attendance, standing room only and not even standing room, who came to say goodbye to this cherished, remarkable, and beloved individual. He will be greatly missed, and I am moved to say that I worked and knew Doctor Hilson for over twenty years. I was impressed by his dignity, his integrity, his kindness, and his wisdom, and he will be sorely missed by all. Thank you.

(The Chair recognized Senator Carson.)

SENATOR CARSON: Thank you, Senate President. Personal privilege, please? Thank you. I would ask my colleagues to join me in sending their condolences to the family of Daniel Franklin Hicks of Londonderry.

Dan passed away peacefully on January 26, 2019 surrounded by his family. He was a husband, a father, brother, grandfather, farmer, conservationist, a Master Sergeant, volunteer fireman, an interim Fire Chief for the town of Londonderry. He was born on July 20, 1936 in the town of Londonderry. He also served in the Air National Guard for 19 years, some of which was active duty. He also served as commander of the Londonderry American Legion Post [Number] 27.

Dan owned Sunnycrest Farm in Londonderry [which, by the way, is one of the best orchards in the state of New Hampshire] along with his brother-in-law. He [also] served as President [of] the NHFG and the NDTFA. His vision made Sunnycrest Farm one of the leading innovative orchards in New England. [He] was instrumental in the formation of the Londonderry Conservation Commission, serving as [its] chairman and remaining a member for 33 years. It was his dedicated work and [his] passion for nature that ensured the purchase of [the] land known as Musquash and the Plummer Property.

He was a true asset to our community, and he will be greatly missed by our town people. Thank you very much, Madam President.

(The Chair recognized Senator Watters.)

SENATOR WATTERS: Thank you, Madam President, and colleagues. I just want to rise for a moment to offer my heartfelt thanks to the Senate and all the members of the Senate family around the period of my sister's death on January 2nd. Even when I was in the hospital with her and some of those hard days, just knowing that I had my Senate family, and that includes my family members, the Senate family was with me— your cards, your calls, all your condolences. And a lot of us have been through it, and it meant so much to me, and I wanted to say thank you to you all.

(The Chair recognized Senator D'Allesandro.)

SENATOR D'ALLESANDRO: Thank you, Madam President. I, too, wanted to thank the Senate and in particular my colleagues. In feelings about the losses, you know, we lost two members of our family in a fifteen day period, and it was very difficult, difficult situations. So thanks to all of you people's support and your prayers. And, you know, it's in tough times when you recognize that you have good friends in this. As my friend Senator Carson said, life is really all about relationships. So let's not forget that. And thanks to all of you for your support. Thank you, Madam President.
