




































































## **Conclusions**

- Population growth in New Hampshire is slow than in past
- However, recent data show renewed domestic migration gains to the state
- Demographic change is uneven across New Hampshire
- New Hampshire's population is aging rapidly
- Diversity is growing in New Hampshire, but the state remains largely non-Hispanic white



## **Implications**

- Migration patterns are a concern because it is an important source of human capital
  - Brings families and children to a state that needs young people
  - Migrants to state are well educated
  - Migrants bring income and expertise to the state
- Uneven pattern of population growth and decline
  - Some towns need to plan to cope with growth and expansion
  - Other communities struggle to provide basic services to declining populations
- Aging population is a concern

  - Rapid growth of senior population is inevitable and soon
