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To provide valued services and supports to assist children, individuals, and families towards upward social and economic well-being. To decrease the need for assistance by providing services and supports, in the areas including, but not limited to: employment, family well-being, and barrier removal.





To assist families and parents with upward economic mobility by promoting work through the provision of employment support and training services in an effort to strengthen families, improving child and family well-being.





- BFA assists individuals and families to gain access to Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Medical Coverage, State Supplemental Programs, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF), and Child Care Scholarship.
- To ensure adults, children, and families have access to: health care, nutritious food, child care, and financial resources to maintain their household.
- BFA also sets policy and program implementation for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF).



Overview – Bureau of Employment Supports

- Provides employment support to people who receive TANF and SNAP through the New Hampshire Employment Program (NHEP).
- Utilizing a Whole Families Approach to Jobs framework, NHEP provides parents with employability skills that will result in establishing viable careers to move children and families out of poverty.
- Ensure participants gain employment, have an understanding of the community resources, obtain assorted life skills to balance work and family, and an identified career pathway to attaining long term career goals.
- Works with employers and educational/training organizations to address labor market needs through training. Focus on training opportunities to assist parents in gaining employment credentials that will result in high wage, high demand industries.





Bureau of Employment Supports Programs

New Hampshire Employment Program (NHEP)

Eligibility: Single parent TANF recipients whose youngest child is under six (20 hours per week) or Six or older (30 hours per week) who is required to participate in the work program. Participating in NHEP for this target group is required in order for you to continue to receive assistance.

Services/Resources include but not limited to:

- Career guidance
- Work readiness and skill development
- Education and training opportunities
- Employment & training support services
- Finding child care
- Obtaining transportation
- Securing housing

SNAP Employment & Training

Eligibility:

Receiving SNAP benefits

Not receiving TANF, GAP or IDP

Is able to work

Assist SNAP recipients in obtaining and maintaining employment by providing focused referrals, financial support for transportation to search for work, and feedback for SNAP E&T participants resumes, job search materials and methods.


NH's SNAP E&T Program was awarded a SNAP E&T Data and Technical Assistance GRANT to improve the SNAP E&T Program infrastructure and data collection capabilities in the amount of \$494,160



Service Delivery

Provide services statewide services through the 11 district offices, plus centralized units. All services are provided by State of NH Employees.

BES services are provided statewide in combination with BES employees and with a contract through Southern New Hampshire Services.






Key Accomplishments

- Successfully transitioned to working remotely without any disruption to individuals receiving services. Individuals are able to apply via phone, fax, email or online. Interview appointments are conducted via phone and face-to face if requested and needed. Individuals have increased on-line use of NH Easy, where they can manage their services and upload documents.
- To increase access to nutritious foods, participated in the SNAP P-EBT (Pandemic-EBT) program collaborative with the Department of Education (DOE), providing additional benefits to households who are eligible for free and /or reduced school breakfast and lunch.
- Began participating in the EBT Online Purchasing Program (OPP) in July of 2020, in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic. OPP allows recipients to make online purchases with EBT issued benefits at FNS approved retailers.
- BES has enhanced collaboration with other statewide work programs:
- Established a strong relationship with Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) programs in NH to increase tuition funding available to upskill NHEP and SNAP participants access to obtaining employer supported credentials
- Trained staff on the NH Work Now program to increase tuition funds available for NHEP and SNAP participants.
- While helping to shift participants from in person training to remote learning, 128 recipients of TANF attained either their high school diploma or equivalency this year.







Workload Benchmarks






4500 & 4510 Budget
