




Judicial Branch

Superior Court






Circuit Court







Improve access to justice in the Circuit Court


Promote diversity, equity and inclusion in the Judicial Branch

Circuit Court History and Structure

The Circuit Court was created in 2011 when the Legislature combined 3 courts.



The consolidation achieved management efficiencies ...

- 2011 52 clerk positions
- 2021 20 clerk positions

... but caused other problems—

 A shortage of judicial officers in Circuit Courts


Judicial Officers in the Circuit Court: Statutory Formula

RSA 490-F:5

The minimum number of judicial officers in the circuit court "shall not be less than" the number authorized for pre-July 1, 2011, district, family, and probate courts and superior court marital masters. That number is 45 full-time.

RSA 490-F:11


To calculate the number of judicial positions required in the circuit court, the supreme court uses an annual weighted case load (WCL). It determines judicial time required for each case, which is then is translated into "judge days." For 2021, that number is 11,182 judge days.




Authorized versus Appointed

Though Circuit Court is authorized to have "no less than" 45 full-time judicial officers, Circuit Court began 2021 with 31 full-time judges and 2 marital masters. [RSA 490-F:5]

Judicial Officers, 2011 and Now



We now have a systemic problem in the Circuit Courts*

With fewer judges we are denying access to justice to the people of New Hampshire.

With retirements, attrition and budgetary restrictions, the number of judicial officers has declined significantly since 2011:

2011 27 judges with 5 vacancies

13 marital masters

29 part-time judicial officers

with 6 vacancies

2021 32 full-time judges with 3 vacancies

2 marital masters6 part-time judges





And the gap is likely to grow worse:

The response to the pandemic has produced a looming backlog

Contested hearings have been postponed


Landlord-Tenant cases will likely significantly increase upon the end of the eviction moratorium

^{*}Despite being authorized to have 45 full-time judicial officers, the Circuit Courts have only 37 funded full-time judicial officers (35 judges + 2 marital masters) in the Circuit Courts in FY21 [RSA 490-F:5]

Options for Addressing Justice Gap


FY22/23 budget as submitted includes 37 funded full-time Circuit Court judges, and 2 marital masters. That will meet

78% of the need.



Options for Addressing Justice Gap

Funding four new judicial positions in FY22/23 will meet 82% of need.



Supplemental proposal: Add two additional Circuit Court judges

45 judicial officers are currently authorized, but only 37 are funded. The FY22/23 supplemental proposal would bring the funded total to 41.

A commitment to fairness and equal justice

Add a New Position to Coordinate Diversity and Access Initiative

- Courts across the country are undertaking efforts to assess judicial systems to ensure that we are meeting the promise of fairness and equal justice for all
- New Hampshire needs to be part of that effort
- The Judicial Branch has initiated a process to identify and implement recommendations with respect to training, recruitment and community engagement
- This supplemental proposal will add an additional position to coordinate the efforts of the Judicial Branch with respect to this initiative, as well as to support efforts to increase access to justice
- This will help align the Judicial Branch with the principles underlying the LEACT Commission recommendations

Doing more by doing it better

Expand Existing Lease to Accommodate Other Court Functions

- The Administrative Office of the Courts assists the Chief Justice with the administration of the Judicial Branch by providing support in the areas of personnel, budget and finance, information technology, and legal counsel
- AOC operates from leased space at One Granite Place, Concord
- There is an opportunity to achieve efficiencies by means of the AOC providing support to 2 important Court functions: the Attorney Discipline Office and the Office of Bar Admissions
- First step is to secure approximately 8700 square feet of space that is immediately adjacent to the AOC's current operations and which recently became available
